Re: Revisions to Immunization Program Section V - Anaphylaxis

There was a request to simplify the guidelines for the management of anaphylaxis. Please note the following changes:

Page 3, Section 4.0 "Administration of Epinephrine:"

- Rather than calculating the dose of epinephrine according to weight, the
 instruction is to use the table that specifies the dose of epinephrine
 according to age. The priority is for the prompt administration of
 epinephrine, and it use should not be delayed.
- Instruction is to repeat epinephrine at 10 to 15 minute intervals, as needed. Previous instruction had been to repeat epinephrine twice at 20minute intervals, as indicated, and to repeat at 10 to 15 minute intervals for severe reactions.

Page 4, Section 5.0 "Administration of Benadryl®:"

Bullet 4 re: oral Benadryl®: dosage has been simplified to 1 mg/kg.

Page 8, Section 11.0 "Emergency Treatment for Anaphylaxis," point #5:

Added instruction re: administration of oral Benadryl®

"Table 2: Recommended Dosages for Epinephrine and Benadryl®:"

Deleted, as the information was a repeat of that in section 11.0.
